Legislative Enactments Part I: Taxes

The following contain the bills that made changes to Nevada's taxes that were passed by the legislature and signed by the Governor. Unless otherwise noted, the effective date for the reported bills is July 1, 2017. Bill language can be found at: www.leg.state.nv.us/Session.

BUSINESS & EXCISE TAXES

AB 6 – Business Licenses for Motion Picture Companies (Issue 1, page 3)

This bill removes the exemption from business licensing for motion picture companies doing business in Nevada.

AB 12 – Insurance Adjuster Licensing (Issue 1, page 3)

This bill allows non-resident and emergency licensure under certain circumstances and at the existing fee.

Effective date to draft regulations May 19, 2017; implementation July 1, 2017

AB 13 – State Business License Name Changes (Issue 1, page 3)

Changes "registration" back to "license" for State business licenses. No change in fees.

SB 54 – Additional Uses for County Infrastructure Taxes (Issue 1, page 3)

Authorizes counties under 100,000 (all except Washoe and Clark) to use infrastructure taxes for some operational expenses but not for salaries and benefits. It also requires a county commission to review these plans at least every four years.

SB 64 – Aviation Fuel Tax Distribution (Issue 1, page 3)

Allows aviation fuel taxes to stay at the airport which collected them.
Effective May 26, 2017

SB 487 – Marijuana Excise Tax at Retail (Issue 7, page 46)

Adds a 10% excise tax at retail sale of recreational marijuana to the voter imposed 15% excise tax at cultivation imposed by voters. Taxes all kinds of marijuana at cultivation at the same rate. Additionally requires the imposition and collection of sales tax at the same rates currently imposed by local governments.

Transfers administration of all types of marijuana to the Department of Taxation except that the Bureau of Healthcare Quality will still process medical marijuana cards and physician recommendations

The tax on medical marijuana at cultivation equals that of recreational/retail marijuana but without the 10% retail excise tax or any sales taxes.

From the 10% excise tax at retail, the Department of Taxation may take its costs to administer the program.

Local governments are also allowed to receive reimbursement for their costs to administer the program but are deemed to be sufficiently compensated at not more than \$5 million in each year of the fiscal year. Local governments are allowed to impose business license fees that are no more than those assessed to other businesses. They are disallowed from imposing more restrictive requirements on the marijuana industry than those enumerated in this bill. These include packaging, labeling, testing, potency, pesticide use, tracking from seed to sale, transportation, registry identification cards or a marijuana registry.

The bill also allows governmental entities within a county to establish marijuana facilities with the agreement of the county. Currently, interest has been expressed from the cities of Fernley and West Wendover to participate in this program.

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Additionally, the bill appears to require the Department of Taxation to issue at least one medical marijuana cultivation facility as well as one production facility in each county (See Section 30, Subsection 4 (a)).

Of note: The Independent Alcohol Distributors Association of Nevada sued to stop a finding by the Department and was given a Preliminary Injunction. They contend that the voters intended that only they could distribute recreational marijuana and its accompanying products between cultivators, manufacturers and retail establishments. The Department has indicated that it intends to appeal but, at this writing, that appeal has not occurred.

MISCELLANEOUS TAXES

AB 375 – Flood Management District (Issue 5, page 33)

Provides for the creation of a flood management district with the authority to review and then bring a variety of taxes to the voters for their approval.

Effective June 12, 2017

SB 176 – Body Cameras (Issue 2, page 8)

This bill requires all peace officers including marshals to wear body cameras. Authorizes county commissions to, by ordinance, raise the per line charge for telephones (wired and cellular) from 25 cents to \$1 per line per month.

Effective date to draft regulations May 27, 2017; implementation July 1, 2017

SB 448 – Transportation Public Private Partnerships (Issue 7, page 48)

The bill allows project delivery by public-private partnership and provides the framework for that delivery method. This new method would also allow imposition of user fees (tolls) as a part of the allowable financing with certain conditions and under the control of the public entity partner.

PROPERTY TAXES

SB 352 – Depreciation Following Disaster (Issue 5, page 34)

Allows properties which are destroyed in a natural disaster on or after July 1, 2012 for which the Governor declares the disaster to maintain the original depreciation of the property. Criteria to receive the depreciation designation

include location on the same parcel of land, original owner occupancy of a single family residence, improvements not more than 110 percent of the original floor area, and not sold or transferred in a transaction against which real property transfer tax applies.

SALES AND USE TAXES

AB 439 – Veterinarian Consumables Tax (Issue 7, page 47)

Provides that the consumables used by a veterinarian in his/her practice (items such as vaccinations) are subject to use tax and provides that the veterinarian is the consumer of those items used in providing treatment in his/her office.

SB 415 – Feminine Hygiene Tax Exemption (Issue 5, page 34)

Creates an exemption from sales and use taxes for feminine hygiene items and asks the voters to do the same for the state portion of the tax.

Effective October 21, 2017 to put the question on the ballot and January 1, 2019 if voters approve the question at the general election on November 6, 2018.

ABATEMENTS & CREDITS

AB 170 – Economic Development Reporting (Issue 2, page 9)

Extends quarterly reporting for the impacts of economic development efforts to June 30, 2020 for projects with at least \$1 billion of capital investment and semiannual reports for projects with at least \$3.5 billion of capital investment until June 30, 2024.

Effective May 19, 2017

AB 492 – Film Tax Credits (Issue 8, page 59)

Allows \$10 million in each fiscal year for transferrable tax credits for film productions. It also removes the previous requirement that the Legislature determine the amount available for these credits and provides that unused credits may carry forward into the next and any future fiscal year.

SB 442 – Rail Improvement District (Issue 7, page 47)

Provides for economic development and extends the definition of “rural” to include areas within a larger county. It also allows cities and counties to undertake certain rail projects. It also allows projects to be located on multiple sites provided the project includes a “common business purpose.”

TAX ADMINISTRATION

AB 8 – Utility Charge Delinquencies (Issue 2, page 9)

Redefines utility services to include sewerage, storm drainage or water service, or any combination of these and allows for the collection of delinquent assessments via the county treasurer.

Effective October 1, 2017.

AB 62 – Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement (Issue 1, page 1)

Adds cigarette vending machines to covered activities for reporting and amends the reporting provisions within the statute as well as amending the nondisclosure of reported data. Increases the minimum bond required to at least \$50,000 and requires the Attorney General to adopt regulations pertaining to the reporting.

AB 422 – Medical Marijuana Administration (Issue 7, page 47)

Moves the administration of the sale of medical marijuana to the Department of Taxation. Transfers the existing program in total except for the medical marijuana card program including physician recommendations. Lowers the annual cost for a card to \$50 and provides the recommending physician maintain the records of the patient recommendation. Removes the existing 2/2/2 percent taxation and imposes a 15% excise tax at cultivation (mirrors the rate for retail marijuana). This means that the marijuana does not need to be separated or tracked until such time as it is sold to the consumer/patient. The bill also removes the prospective requirement to check an out-of-state medical marijuana card holder against a data base and deems that a patient is included within any database. The bill also provides that cities, towns and counties are limited in their regulatory authority, also a mirror to retail marijuana regulatory structure.

AB 486 – Government Services Tax Distribution (Issue 7, page 48)

Allocates the proceeds of the Governmental Services Tax to the Highway Fund (75 percent) and to the General Fund (25 percent) for the next two years. The bill originally proposed to make the allocation 50/50 and to extend the sunset permanently. Our friends at the Nevada Chapter Associated General Contractors did some heavy lifting to protect a tax with a clear nexus to its user and in defense of the Highway Fund into which the Governmental Services Tax was originally designed to go.

SB 281 – Collection and Proceeds of Delinquent Taxes (Issue 4, page 26)

Provides that home owners associations may receive distri-

bution of excess proceeds from the sale of a property for delinquent taxes so long as the association has a recorded notice of default and election to sell.

VEHICLE & FUEL TAXES

SB 399 – Vintage License Plates (Issue 5, page 36)

Extends the date that the Department of Motor Vehicles may issue vintage license plates for any vehicle manufactured not later than 1961 (formerly 1942).

AB154	Lowered the threshold for prevailing wage and removed the school reduction to 90%	Would have been a roll back of the reforms of 2015.
AB175*	Required minimum wage to increase annually to include “health benefits” requirement	Potentially unconstitutional and would damage recovery of Nevada’s small businesses.
AB188	Reduced the number of required credit hours to receive the Silver State Opportunity Grant	NSHE data supports higher credit hours as likely to lead to more successful completions of degree programs.
AB271	Amended collective bargaining to require a final binding award by an arbitrator	Reverses a bipartisan compromise from 2015.
AB272	Voting centers	Similar to a 2013 bill which was also vetoed. Concerns with that bill not addressed or mitigated.
AB277	Land use planning (Red Rock)	Constitutionally suspect. And contrary to existing Nevada Supreme Court rulings
AB290*	Collective bargaining including concessions deemed given for leave for union activity	Reverses bipartisan compromise legislation from 2015.
AB364	Interim study of traffic in southern Nevada by RTC and local governments	Duplicative with existing NDOT work and intrusive upon executive branch responsibilities.
AB374*	Health plan within Medicaid for purchase by Nevadans	Creates uncertainty within the insurance realm while not clearly defining the problems it seeks to solve.
AB403*	Legislative Commission administrative regulatory oversight increase	Constitutionally doubtful and unnecessary. Creates an imbalance between the branches of government.
AB408*	State Medicaid coverage requirements	Reduces flexibility of health plans to design coverage. Duplicative of other similar bills of the session.
SB106*	Minimum wage increases	Damaging to the recovery of Nevada’s small businesses and potentially reduces employment opportunities for entry level workers.
SB196*	Paid sick leave	Mandated and damaging provision for small businesses. Employee benefits should be reserved to the business owner and in response to the marketplace
SB356*	Collective bargaining and evergreen clauses	Reverses a bipartisan compromise from 2015
SB397	Expands authority of Nevada Equal Rights Commission	The proper venue for challenges to employment discrimination is the courts
SB469	Collective bargaining and reduction in ending fund balance set outside the bargaining process	Reducing ending fund balances puts local governments and school districts in more precarious positions. Rolls back bipartisan agreements from 2015.
